

<sup>1</sup>These are also proverbs of Solomon, which the men of Hezekiah king of Judah copied out.<sup>2</sup>It is the glory of God to conceal a thing: but the honour of kings is to search out a matter.<sup>3</sup>The heaven for height, and the earth for depth, and the heart of kings is unsearchable.<sup>4</sup>Take away the dross from the silver, and there shall come forth a vessel for the finer.<sup>5</sup>Take away the wicked from before the king, and his throne shall be established in righteousness.<sup>6</sup>Put not forth thyself in the presence of the king, and stand not in the place of great men:<sup>7</sup>For better it is that it be said unto thee, Come up hither; than that thou shouldest be put lower in the presence of the prince whom thine eyes have seen.<sup>8</sup>Go not forth hastily to strive, lest thou know not what to do in the end thereof, when thy neighbour hath put thee to shame.<sup>9</sup>Debate thy cause with thy neighbour himself; and discover not a secret to another:<sup>10</sup>Lest he that heareth it put thee to shame, and thine infamy turn not away.<sup>11</sup>A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver.<sup>12</sup>As an earring of gold, and an ornament of fine gold, so is a wise reprovcr upon an obedient ear.<sup>13</sup>As the cold of snow in the time of harvest, so is a faithful messenger to them that send him: for he refresheth the soul of his masters.<sup>14</sup>Whoso boasteth himself of a false gift is like

clouds and wind without rain.<sup>15</sup>By long forbearing is a prince persuaded, and a soft tongue breaketh the bone.<sup>16</sup>Hast thou found honey? eat so much as is sufficient for thee, lest thou be filled therewith, and vomit it.<sup>17</sup>Withdraw thy foot from thy neighbour's house; lest he be weary of thee, and so hate thee.<sup>18</sup>A man that beareth false witness against his neighbour is a maul, and a sword, and a sharp arrow.<sup>19</sup>Confidence in an unfaithful man in time of trouble is like a broken tooth, and a foot out of joint.<sup>20</sup>As he that taketh away a garment in cold weather, and as vinegar upon nitre, so is he that singeth songs to an heavy heart.<sup>21</sup>If thine enemy be hungry, give him bread to eat; and if he be thirsty, give him water to drink:<sup>22</sup>For thou shalt heap coals of fire upon his head, and the LORD shall reward thee.<sup>23</sup>The north wind driveth away rain: so doth an angry countenance a backbiting tongue.<sup>24</sup>It is better to dwell in the corner of the housetop, than with a brawling woman and in a wide house.<sup>25</sup>As cold waters to a thirsty soul, so is good news from a far country.<sup>26</sup>A righteous man falling down before the wicked is as a troubled fountain, and a corrupt spring.<sup>27</sup>It is not good to eat much honey: so for men to search their own glory is not glory.<sup>28</sup>He that hath no rule over his own spirit is like a city that is broken down, and without walls.
