The daughters saw her, and blessed her; yea, the queens and the concubines, and they praised her. <sup>10</sup>Who is she that looketh forth as the morning, fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners? <sup>11</sup>I went down into the garden of nuts to see the fruits of the valley, and to see whether the vine flourished, and the pomegranates budded. <sup>12</sup>Or ever I was aware, my soul made me like the chariots of Amminadib. <sup>13</sup>Return, return, O Shulamite; return, return, that we may look upon thee. What will ye see in the Shulamite? As it were the company of two armies.
